DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

1. Why did John the Baptist preach repentance, and what obstacle was he trying to remove so people could receive Jesus?
2. What does John mean when he says, “Produce fruit in keeping with repentance” (Luke 3:8)?
3. According to the sermon, what are the three essential parts of repentance?
4. Why does John say that being a child of Abraham—or having a strong spiritual heritage—does not exempt someone from repentance?
5. When the crowd asked, “What should we do?” what kinds of practical, visible actions did John give as examples of repentance?

Heart-Level Reflection Questions

1. Where in your life have you been relying on spiritual familiarity or background instead of personal repentance and obedience?
2. Is there any area where you feel conviction but have resisted confession or real change—what might God be asking you to turn from today?
3. If someone looked at the “fruit” of your life, what would it reveal about what you truly believe about Jesus?
4. When you think about standing before God on your own “Day of the Lord,” what stirs in your heart—confidence, fear, urgency, or avoidance? Why?
5. When God asks, “What should you do?” what specific action or step of obedience comes to mind right now?
